I am one of the fortunate few to have the pleasure to have received a tag to hunt black bear in Nevada. Additionally, I was successful in my hunt.

Due to the militant actions and ignorant comments I have read on the internet from those who oppose the hunt, I choose to remain anonymous at this time.

I want to make a few points about hunting in Nevada and the bear hunt.

First, unlike previous generations, hunting is now regulated by the government and is a privilege. My choice has been to observe and follow the laws and rules to ensure that my rights as a hunter are not infringed upon. The expansion of hunting species, like the black bear, is an awesome opportunity for more hunters to be involved in hunting.

Second, I am not a trophy hunter. I hunt for a variety of reasons but hanging the biggest mount on my wall is not on the list. Opponents of the bear hunt all hunt for their meat too, they just do it in a grocery store. They consume animals of which the husbandry is always in question and making headline news. It is their right and choice to hunt at the grocery store but I believe my choice is better when it comes to providing quality nutrition for my family. I find it interesting that the opponents of the black bear hunt have chosen not to become involved in protesting the hunting of other mammals in this fine state.

Third, the bear hunt provided for me one of the best memories and experiences of my life. I hope to see that expanded to any hunter who has an interest. I applaud the Commission and the State of Nevada for their decision to open black bear hunting in Nevada.

Dear Sirs,

I want to open by saying; I am neither for nor against hunting bears. I understand the need to limit the population growth of these bears over the next decade so that the number of incidents in populated areas does not result in the euthanizing of even more bears than are currently being hunted lawfully. I am neither an extremist conversationalist or hunting fanatic, I am like most people, I am in the middle and I would like to see a compromise reached that everyone can be proud of and happy with the end result. It is with this mindset that I would like to offer my proposal for a solution, my view from the middle of an acceptable compromise.

First on the issue of the current hunt, I would suggest that it be allowed to continue until the expiration of the current season of issued tags, to stop it now would be too costly to the state already facing mounting budget issues.

As far as population control in the future I would like to propose the following solution:

Instead of hunting permits the NDOW issue Tranq, Snip & Clip permits, these permits would be issued in the same manner as hunting permits. The hunter who received the permit would be assigned to a specific problem area and would be tasked with bringing a veterinary professional with them on the hunt. The purpose of the hunt would be to Tranquilize the bear and then have the veterinary professional determine if the animal qualified for sterilization based on age and location. If the Animal met certain conditions it would be sterilized and allowed to return to the wild. The veterinary professional would additionally trim one of the bears hind claws in such a way as to not harm the animal but provide the hunter with a trophy for his contribution to the helping manage the bear population. Additionally once sedated the hunter would be allowed to take photos of the bear as well.

Obviously a mathematical model would be needed to determine the number of bears that would need to be neutered in a given season/area.

I do believe that such a compromise would work out to the benefit of all those who have a strong interest on both sides of this issue. It could also be modified to allow for hunters to help with the tracking of these animals for additional scientific research in order to better determine how many and what the potential threats bears may pose in the future even if no bears needed to be sterilized in a given season.

I thank you for your time and for considering this proposition from someone in the middle who wants to see everyone win. Please feel free to contact me if you would like to discuss this further or would like help ironing out the details on how we could make this compromise a reality.

This hunt should not have gone forward in the first place. Not only was public opinion so greatly against it, but the science was weak, inaccurate, and needed much clarification and verifiable evidence. This hunt is not about killing nuisance bears. The bears being killed are wildland bears. Even if hunters did kill a few nuisance bears during this hunt, that will not stop future bears from moving through urban areas. As more and more of their habitat becomes fragmented and degraded, bears will be forced to move through urban areas. A more responsible and effective solution for taking care of nuisance bears would be to educate the public on how to properly store their trash.

NDOW's mission is "To protect, preserve, manage and restore wildlife and its habitat for the aesthetic, scientific, educational, recreational, and economic benefits to citizens of Nevada and the United States, and to promote the safety of persons using vessels on the waters of Nevada."

However, killing bears does not protect nor preserve, nor manage responsibly, and certainly does not restore the bear population. As far as the economic benefits to the citizens of Nevada goes, tourist dollars from people who come here to see our iconic wilderness and its bears are far greater than the money gleaned from bear hunters.

This is a small population of bears and their habitat is already badly degraded and fragmented as it is. The vast majority of the people of Nevada want to see these bears protected.

The state needs to listen to the will of its people and vote to end the bear hunt.
