Local chapters of the National Wild Turkey Federation would be notified and may participate in the release operation. Other upland game related user groups such as the Carson Valley Chukar Club will also be contacted for participation.

Habitat Evaluation:

Habitat along the East Fork of the Walker River within the Walker River Recreation Area is suitable for Rio Grande turkeys. There are numerous galleries of Fremont Cottonwoods along with willow and buffalo berry stands. Other shrubs and riparian species associated with the river bottom are available. Turkeys should distribute themselves from the historic Pitchfork Ranch to the Rafter 7 Ranch upstream and beyond.

Predator Evaluation:

Potential predator control was not evaluated due to the area's designation as a State Recreation area. There is potential for raven removal in the area.

Habitat Evaluation:

The east and west side of the Desatoya Mountains have burned and have been rehabilitated with a variety of wheatgrasses as well as shrubs. Large and small spring complexes consisting of wild rose, elderberry, snowberry, and chokecherry are available. All forage species are in excellent shape in the area. Aspen stands are multi-age classed with plenty of herbaceous understory for cover.

Predator Evaluation:

Other upland game bird populations have increased in recent years in this area and are following normal cycles suggesting that there are no abnormal numbers of predators or a need for predator control in the area at this time.

In discussions with the Forest Service (Kyra Walton, Wildlife Biologist, Jarbidge Ranger District), ruffed grouse are considered native to Jarbidge and surrounding areas thus there is no need for an EA for augmentation.

Notification of User Groups (include methods and dates):

Habitat Evaluation:

There are large expanses of aspen for forage, cover, nesting, escape, and thermal protection. There are also a variety of shrubs (such as serviceberry and snowberry), forbs, and grasses associated with the aspen communities. Grazing is fairly intense directly near water sources, but quickly disperses throughout the aspen stringers.

Elk Mountain and associated drainages offer moderate amounts of suitable ruffed grouse habitat and provides an opportunity for linkage with the Jarbidge and Bruneau populations.
