- Please be as brief as possible. Attempt to answer as many questions as you can. We understand that you may not have all the answers right now and we will try to help gather additional information as part of the application process.
- Attach separate pages if necessary.

Project Information and Application Form Instructions:

1. Give this Project a title ! It may be a title that will associate it with the property owner's name.
2. Private: This is important. NDOW LIP funding can only be used on private property.
3. Owner: self-explanatory.
4. Agent or manager: Who is the contact person (i.e. ranch manager) for this property if not the landowner?
5. Description: Provide a description of what you want to do on this property.
6. Acres: Provide the number of acres that will be directly improved by this project.
7. Location: include the general location of the project area in Nevada. Provide the County and Legal Description or GPS coordinates if you have them. Please include a map of the location of the property and the project site if possible.
8. Adjacent Property use and acreage: How is the adjacent property being used and how much acreage is there? (i.e. is there Federal forest or BLM land bordering the property, or is it private property?)
9. Vegetation: A general description of vegetation present on the land, including riparian, upland, or predominance of non-native vegetation.
10. Wetland: Describe the river, creek, drainage, or wetland and show it on the map if you can.
11. Why: Describe why this project is necessary; what problem(s) will be resolved?
12. Species: List any "priority species of conservation concern" that may be present or impacted by the proposed project. You can find a complete list of these species at:

13. Results and Benefits: Describe the “on-the-ground” improvements to the land and how this will benefit the target species. (i.e. fencing off a riparian area to encourage growth of native vegetation, or removal of non-native vegetation and reseeding of native species).
14. Methods: How will the desired results be achieved? (i.e. mechanical removal of non-native vegetation).
15. Maintenance of Project: How long is the landowner willing to maintain the improvement? A longer commitment for maintenance of any project will give the project more points; this will place the project higher in the ranking process.
16. Monitoring of the Project: Projects must be monitored for success-this is required. Who will be responsible for this activity? Will you need help with monitoring?
17. Costs: Provide an estimate if you can. Costs of a project will usually be figured by the funding agencies. These funding sources may include the Natural Resources Conservation Service, USDA Fish and Wildlife Service, Ducks Unlimited, The Nature Conservancy, etc.
18. In-Kind Matches: In-Kind contributions are those items or labor that can be provided by the landowner. This could include your time or labor, or the use and maintenance of your equipment or materials.
19. 3rd Party: Describe any other agencies or cooperators that have the potential to provide funds, labor, or materials for this project. Please describe how they will be involved.
20. Other agencies: Please list what other agencies or organizations you have contacted regarding this project. This will prevent NDOW from repeating your work !
21. Anything else: Please include anything else you would like to discuss about this project proposal.
