
Lorenzi Park Pond

FISHERY AND STOCKING INFORMATION





General information: The Lorenzi Pond is located at Lorenzi Park in northwest Las Vegas. The location of the pond was the site of the historic Twin Lakes, one of the original major spring systems that fed the Las Vegas Wash before the valley was settled. In 2013, the park and pond were renovated with improved landscaping and picnic areas. After the pond was renovated, the City of Las Vegas stocked Bluegill and Largemouth Bass. The primary fishing is comprised of Rainbow Trout and Channel Catfish, with catchable-sized fish stocked seasonally. Occasionally Bluegill are stocked. No stocking occurs in July due to excessive heat.

Location: 3333 W Washington Ave, Las Vegas, Clark County.

Size: The pond is approximately 3 surface acres with a maximum depth of 10 feet.

Management: Nevada Department of Wildlife manages the fishery as a Cold Water Urban Fishery during the colder months and a Warm Water Urban Fishery during the warmer months of the year. The pond and park are managed by the City of Las Vegas.

General Information

- No boats or flotation devices.
- No entrance fees.

Regulations

- A fishing license is required for anglers 12 years of age or older.
- Season is open year-round during park hours only.
- Limit is 3 game fish.
- The use of bait fish is prohibited.

Fishing notes

- 2022 average catch rates from interviewed anglers were 0.6 fish/hour and 1.3 fish/angler day.
- Angling for stocked trout and catfish is best within a week of stocking, though there may be holdover fish from previous stockings.
- Fishing slows in late spring (April) and late fall (October) as water temperatures change during the transition from stocking trout to catfish.
- Small spinners, Power Bait, and salmon eggs are effective for catching trout.
- Prepared catfish baits, hot dogs, and chicken liver have been used successfully to catch Channel Catfish.
- Small jigs and worms are suggested for Bluegill.
